Manuel F. Zamora, Ph.D.
Assistant Professor
Homeland Security & Criminal Justice
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Manuel received his doctorate degree from the University of Houston. His formal education includes Social Work, Sociology, Criminology, and Criminal Justice. He is a graduate of the 180th FBI National Academy and numerous leadership schools. He recently retired with 31 years of service to the

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Houston Police Department where he worked violent crimes investigations (robbery, sexual assault, and homicide) and managed recruitment, human resources, field training, and court support.

Dr. Zamora participated in planning and logistics design for large-scale events such as Super Bowl XXXVIII, the Republican National Convention, the World G-7 Economic Summit, the Houston Rockets and Houston Astros professional sporting events and playoffs, and parades and demonstrations. He also assisted with security plans for visiting dignitaries and heads of state. He participated in emergency response and planning for Hurricanes Katrina, Allison, Rita, Edouard, and Ike. He authored and designed the Houston *Real Time Crime Center*, a \$2 million project that ranks among the most advanced crime centers in the U.S.

Recently, Dr. Zamora chaired the 2012 International Conference on Transborder and Narco-Terrorism, which attracted police, military, and security personnel, as well as researchers and students from the U.S. and Latin America. Dr. Zamora currently holds a reserve captain position with the Harris County Constable's Office, Precinct 2, where he is consulted on grant proposals for emergency services and response, and disaster planning.

His work has spanned over much of the southern United States with a concentration in the Midwest and Texas.

Professor Pullin has been a member of the Executive Advisory Board over training and curriculum for The Victoria College Police Training Academy for more than 8 years that manages all aspects of training and includes preparation for TCLEOSE examinations. He is also a member of the Criminal Justice Advisory Committee for the 14 county region of West Texas surrounding San Angelo, Texas. Pullin has authored law enforcement training manuals as well as authored articles on Emergency Management Preparation post Hurricane Katrina and Rita as well as the effects of evacuees on the Criminal Justice System in target cities post natural disasters.
